Dual Admission

Dual admission allows students to be enrolled both at COTC and another college or university at the same time. This allows

students to take advantage of programs and services such as library privileges, advising, and academic support at both institutions, while seamlessly earning both an associate degree and a bachelor's degree.

Dual Enrollment

Dual Enrollment is a partnership between COTC and high schools to award college credit for courses taught by the high school teacher, credentialed as COTC faculty. Students also earn high school credit for the courses. Tuition is free.

College Tech Prep

COTC is a member of the Central Region Tech Prep program. Tech Prep students at COTC earn college credits and prepare for successful careers while enrolled in high school. College Tech Prep programs are offered to high school juniors and seniors.

Post-secondary Enrollment Options

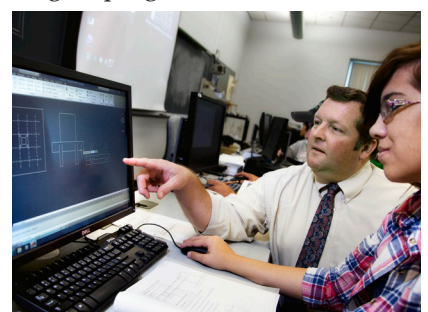
PSEOP is a state-funded program that allows high school students grades 9-12 to enroll in college for high school and college credits.

Concurrent Enrollment Options

This program allows high school students in grades 9-12 to enroll in college courses at a reduced cost.

Transfer Options

Estimated Costs

Full-time tuition: \$2,148

Admission Requirements

Regular admission as an associate degree or certificate seeking student to Central Ohio Technical College is based upon meeting one of the following requirements:

1. High school graduate, or
2. Completed home schooling at the secondary level, or
3. Passed the General Education Development Test (GED), or
4. If applicant has not met 1, 2, or 3 above, must be 18 years of age or older.



Financial Aid
