

The following data represent responses to COTC's Entrance Survey between March 29 and September 3, 2022.

COTC students complete the questionnaire as part of their broader Canvas orientation course. Questions relate to how the student will pay for college, plans for work outside of college, access to reliable transportation, housing, and food sources, time-use, and motivation for schooling which are shared with the college's student success coaches so they can be proactive in outreach to support students in meeting their end goals from the moment they start at the college. Responses are grouped by topic area. The total "N" of respondents is 897. START TERM: Considering the survey administration period, 97% of respondents indicated a desire to start in autumn 2022 with 3% indicating a desire to start in spring semester 2023.

ENROLLMENT STATUS: Fifty-five percent of respondents indicated a desire to attend as a full-time student taking at least 12.0 credits in their first term.

PAYING FOR COLLEGE: Seventy-five percent of respondents indicated that their own income or savings would be a major or minor source of funding for college. The next major or minor funding source these students indicated was grants and scholarships (65%) followed by student loans (58%).

WORKING WHILE IN SCHOOL: Sixty-two percent of respondents indicated their plan to work at least 20 hours per week while attending school while only 9% had no plan to work.

HOUSING: Forty-three percent of respondents indicate that they are *currently* living in a home that they own or rent. Nearly half (47%) responded that they will be sharing a home they don't own with others. Two individuals (<1%) reported being without a current place to live. Proportions are consistent for how students responded to where they *plan* to live with 4 students saying they plan to live on campus.

Eight percent of respondents indicated having to temporarily stay with friends or family when they didn't have stable housing. Less than 5 percent of respondents reported needing to sleep in a car, couch surf, temporarily stay in a hotel or motel, stay in a shelter, sleep in a building not meant for human to live, or staying in an RV or camper. While it's a small proportion, this translates to 82 unique individuals who reported at least one housing insecurity.

TRANSPORTATION: Twenty respondents (2%) indicated they do not have reliable transportation, and of these students, 7 reported that a family member or friend will drop them off. Two of these students reported that they plan to only take online courses, however, if they do need to come to campus for any reason, may still need transportation assistance. Ninety-eight percent of respondents expect their transportation to be reliable and the vast majority plan to drive themselves.

FAMILY CARETAKING: The majority of respondents (68%) indicate they do not have any dependents in their household, child or adult. However, a sizeable subgroup (32%) reports having to take care of others. Of these, most dependents being reported are children. Thirty respondents with dependent children and 4 with dependent adults indicated have no or unreliable care arranged. Some of the individuals left comments that their dependents are older and can stay home by themselves and another indicated that they planned to take all online courses.

INTERNET ACCESS AND TECHNOLOGY: Forty-eight respondents indicated that they either do not have access to an internet connection at home or that it's unreliable. Some respondents without reliable internet at home left comments that they plan to go to the library.

All respondents reported having access to some technology with 45% indicating having access to both a desktop computer, laptop computer, and a smartphone. Fifty-nine individuals reported having access to only a smartphone and 10 reported having access to only a tablet. Only 2 of the individuals reporting having access to only a smartphone plan to take all online courses.

FOOD SECURITY: Twenty-six percent of respondents indicated that they sometimes or often worried about running out of food before they had money to buy more.

In the last year, 108 unique respondents indicated experiencing some type of food insecurity such as skipping meals, eating less than they wanted to, or losing weight because they couldn't but food. The most-commonly cited issue with food access was cutting the size of meals due to having money to buy more.

SLEEP HABITS: Most respondents report sleeping between 6 and 10 hours per night on average (78%) but 185 respondents (21%) report sleeping less than 6 hours per average. A smaller group of 15 respondents (2%) report sleeping more than 10 hours per night on average.

SUPPORT FOR ATTENDING COLLEGE FROM FAMILY AND FRIENDS: Eighty-seven percent of respondents report that their family or friends are supportive of them attending COTC. Eighteen respondents (2%) report not receiving support from family or friends to attend COTC.

Cross-referencing the support system results with the reported parent's or guardian's highest level of education shows that individuals with low levels of family support for attending college also have a lower rate of parent's or guardian's having attended college. On average, students who reported having low support for attending college were 29.8 years old compared to those reporting high levels of support being 25.6, a 4.2-year gap.

MOTIVATION AND EFFICACY: Respondents are asked to self-assess a variety of factors related to their motivation for attending college and confidence in their ability to succeed. Eighty-seven percent of individuals report to strongly agree with the statement "I am dedicated to earning my college degree no mater what obstacles get in my way." Majorities of respondents strongly agreed across items. On the counterpoint items, "I tend to give up quickly on things that are difficult" and "asking questions makes me uncomfortable," response rates of somewhat or strongly disagreeing were 71% and 48%, respectively.

DEMOGRAPHICS: The average age of respondents was 25.8 with 154 (17%) of individuals indicating being 18 years old and 373 (42%) indicated 25 years of age and older. Seventy-three percent of individuals identify as white, alone, and 16% as black, alone. Two percent of respondents indicate not being a citizen of the United States and 8% report being naturalized citizens. Sixty percent of respondents report at least one parent or guardian as having at least some college however nearly 4-in-10 (39%) report parents or guardians without any college attendance. Forty-six percent of these individuals identify their family's economic status as "lower middle/working class" and 37% identify as solidly in the middle class. Twenty-eight individuals report having a past issue with incarceration. Ten percent of individuals report that English was not their first language.
