FAMILY EDUCATIONAL RIGHTS AND PRIVACY ACT (FERPA)

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) provides students certain rights with respect to their educational records. They include the right to: 1) inspect and review these records; 2) request an amendment to the records; 3) consent to or restrict

disclosures of personally identifiable information in the records; and 4) file a complaint with the U.S. Department of Education concerning the College's alleged failure to comply with FERPA. Students who change their schedule or drop classes may receive a refund of unearned tuition and fees in accordance with the Course Refund Pattern available [here](#). INSTITUTIONAL DRUG AND ALCOHOL POLICY

FINANCIAL AID PENALTIES FOR DRUG LAW VIOLATIONS

A student convicted of possessing or selling drugs after the FAFSA is submitted, and while receiving Federal Financial Aid, must notify Student Financial Services immediately at Hopewell Hall, 1179 University Drive, Newark, Ohio 43055; phone (740) 366-9435; or [email](#). In general, if convicted of a drug-related felony or misdemeanor that took place while receiving Federal Student Aid, the student will become ineligible to receive further aid for a specified period upon conviction.
